In today's lesson we find

• A picture of sin and salvation

Acts Chapter 3

- Here we find a picture of the sinner.
 - The external world is a reflection of the spiritual.
 - The lame man
 crouching at the gate
 and unable to enter it
 is a type of the sinner's condition.
 - He was <u>not</u> complete,
 - And so is <u>every</u> sinner.

- This cripple is a vivid illustration of the lost sinner in that:
- He could <u>not walk</u>, and no sinner can walk so as to please God;
- He was <u>outside the temple</u>, and sinners are outside God's temple, the church;
- He was <u>begging</u>, for sinners are beggars, searching for

- What a cripple is among men, <u>a sinner is before God.</u>
 - All sin works by <u>privation</u>.
 - It shuts up <u>senses</u>
 - It closes the inlets of life that were meant to provide joy and happiness.
 - That is what mankind had in the Garden of Eden.
- Everything the heart could desire.

- In the Gospel dispensation the Messiah exhibits
 great power for a great purpose.
 - <u>Isaiah 35</u> predicted it.
 - 35:5 The blind will be able to see, and the deaf will hear.
- 35:6 The lame will leap and dance, and those who cannot speak will shout for joy.

- The man's conduct after the miracle shows how every Christian ought to act:
 - He entered the temple in fellowship with God's servants
 - He <u>praised</u> God.
 - His had a <u>new walk</u>
 - And a <u>new outlook</u> on life.

- Peter used this healing
 as an opportunity
 to present Christ
 and offer forgiveness
 to the Jewish nation.
- He <u>preached Christ</u> to them and accused them of denying their own Messiah.
 - Not a popular message then or now. (Acts 4:1-3)

- Just a few weeks before,
 Peter himself had denied Christ three times.
 - Yet because Peter
 <u>confessed his sin</u>
 and made things right
 with the Lord
 (Matthew 26:75;Acts 3:19)
- He like the Apostle Paul was able to forget his failure.
 - (Philippians 3:13)

- Act 3:17 is most important, for there Peter stated that Israel's ignorance caused them to commit this awful crime.
 - Ignorance is no excuse, but it does affect t he penalty handed out.
 - This is why Jesus prayed,
 "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do"

 (Luke 23:34).

- God was now giving Israel

 one more opportunity
 to receive their Messiah.
 - Peter reminds them of God's promise:
 - Isaiah 43:25

I am the one who blots out your transgressions for my sake, and I will not remember your sins.

- "Blotting out their sins" (Acts 3:19)
 - The word used here refers to the practice of writing on tables covered with wax.
 - The debt is recorded.
 - The debt is <u>paid</u>.
- The wax is now smooth over.
- Thus <u>removing every trace</u> of the debt.
 - This is the way
 God forgives sins.

Let us note
 three things
 in Peter's sermon.

- (# 1) The crucifixion was the greatest crime in human history.
 - It is a crime that shocks the senses.
- The crucifixion makes us realize the enormity of sin and its consequences.
 - Peter is telling his listeners,
 "Look what sin can do."

- (# 2) Peter tells his listeners that the Holy One they crucified <u>is alive and well.</u>
 - And that with the power of the resurrection many O.T. prophecies have been fulfilled.
 - Acts 3:18
 God announced long ago through all the prophets
 that his Messiah had to suffer;
 - But now the resurrection was proof that he was Lord of life and of death.

- (#3) Peter stresses the power of the Risen Lord to forgive that sin.
 - Acts 3:26 Unto you first God, having raised up his Son Jesus, sent him to bless you, in turning away every one of you from his iniquities.

- Their repentance and forgiveness would be the means of a new peace and joy.
- "Repent, and be converted". (Acts 3:19)
- You have been <u>great sinners</u>,
 - You have <u>crucified</u> the Lord,
 - And you are in <u>danger</u>.
- Now is the chance for <u>forgiveness</u>.

- <u>Times of refreshing.</u> (Acts 3:19-20)
 - The word rendered
 "<u>refreshing</u>,
 means properly
 "<u>breathing</u>,".
- After <u>being exhausted</u> from labors, running, etc.
 - It hence denotes
 <u>rest</u>, or <u>deliverance</u>
 from evils of any kind.
 - It is used nowhere else in the New Testament,

- Times of refreshing
 shall come from
 the presence of the Lord.
 (Acts 3:19)
 - Only God could make that promise.
 - "Where could I go but to the Lord?"

- In the East it was
 the custom for beggars
 to sit at the entrance
 to a temple or a shrine.
- Such a place was considered the best of all stances because when people are on their way to worship God they are disposed to be generous to their fellow men.

- William Henry Davies
 was a Welsh
 poet and writer.
 - Davies spent a significant part of his life as a tramp or hobo, in the United Kingdom and United States,
- And became one of the most popular poets of his time.

 W. H. Davies, the tramp poet, tells how one of his vagrant friends told him that, whenever he came into a new town, he looked for a church spire with a cross on the top and began to beg in that area.

- Peter's sermon began with a note of mercy and warning combined.
- It was <u>in ignorance</u> that the Jews perpetrated the terrible deed of the crucifixion;
 - But that ignorance
 is no longer an excuse
 for their further rejection
 of Jesus Christ.

- This note of the terrifying responsibility of knowledge echoes all through the New Testament.
- "If you were blind. you would have no guilt; but now that you say 'We see,' your guilt remains" (John 9:41).
- "If I had not come and spoken to them, they would not have sin; but now they have no excuse for their sin" (John 15:22).

- "Whoever knows what is right to do and fails to do it, for him it is sin" (James 4:17).
- To have seen the full light of the revelation of God is the greatest of privileges,
- But it is also the <u>most terrible of responsibilities.</u>

- The obligation this knowledge brings is the obligation to repent and to turn.
 - And it is an easier thing to change one's mind than to change one's life.
 - But this change of mind
 is to result in
 a turning away
 from the old way
 and a beginning of the new.

- This repentance will have certain consequences.
 - It will affect the past as sins are wiped out.
- It will also affect the <u>future</u>;
 - As it brings
 times of refreshing
 there will be:.
- # 1 Strength in weakness
- # 2 And a rest in weariness.

- Peter goes on to speak of the coming again of Christ.
 - He warns them that the Crucified One will be returning.
 - What then?

- If <u>discouraged</u> by '<u>Silver and gold have I none</u>,'
- He hears of something more indeed:

 What I have, this I give thee:
 in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth
 rise up and walk.'
 - God's word still has
 power to create.

 as He created the world.
 - He says,
 Let there be light;
 and there is light;
 - Let there be life! and there is life.

- The lame man needed <u>strength</u>,
 - And this is the divine gift of the gospel.
 - "It is the <u>power</u> of God unto salvation."
 - The Savior makes us able to <u>walk</u> and <u>leap</u> in God's ways.

- There is in every lifetime one moment of special opportunity.
- No one knows how long the lame man had been lying at the gate; but one day he met his opportunity.

- So the <u>Samaritan</u> woman met hers at the well,
 - Matthew met his at his table,
 - The **Ethiopian** met his in the desert.
 - Success is to grasp at the opportunity;
 - Failure is to let it pass.

- In this miracle
 the power lay not
 in Peter's hand,
- But in Jesus's name.
 - Only a
 <u>Divine power</u>
 could heal the cripple,
- And only a
 <u>Divine power</u>
 can make the sinner whole.

- It is in this scene we see a picture of the saved man.
- See how he represents the soul just after the new birth
 - Arrayed
 in the image of
 Christ Jesus.

- We behold the <u>transformation</u>.
 - A moment ago he was <u>a begging cripple</u>;
- Now he stands and leaps with joy.
 - Romans 15:13
 May God, the source of hope, fill you with all joy and peace

- His <u>first act</u> is to enter through the Beautiful gate into the temple.
- Let us notice his gratitude.
- Every saved soul should make confession of what God has done for him.

- There is a Name which can make us whole again.
- Your soul wants precisely
 what that poor cripple's body wanted,
- Power to stand, to walk, to leap,
 and to utter forth the praises of God.
 - And that power is in Christ, and in Christ alone.
 - <u>Light</u> to the blind,
 - Strength to the impotent,
 - Life to the dead.

- The more you think of it earnestly, the more you will find that life is just what you need.
 - A man whose system
 is worn out
 can be patched up
 for a while by the physicians,
 - But a new infusion of life into it is what it needs.

- •Give it that, or you patch and prop in vain.
- This is what Christ can truly do for your soul.

- It is all summed up in the word "In Him is life."
- Proverbs 12:28
 In the way of righteousness is life; and in the pathway thereof there is no death.
 - That life, God's life,
 - He will give to any who ask.
 - Acts 3:3
 Who seeing Peter and John

about to go into the temple asked an alms.

- This is the time to believe on that Name,
 - To rise up and walk.
 - Does God care for broken lives?
- Let that poor cripple <u>answer</u>.
- Let the Lord's works of mercy answer.

- John 6:12
 When they were filled,
 he said unto his disciples,
 Gather up the fragments
 that remain,
 that nothing be lost.
 - Did this foreshadow His ministry?
 - Our Lord gathered
 <u>fragments of food</u>
 and

 <u>fragments of humanity.</u>

- Note the fragments
 He gathered
 along the way...
 - Publicans,
 - Harlots,
 - Thieves,
 - Prodigals,
- Whatever the world flung out as worthless
 He gathered.


- The lame man sought <u>alms</u>,
 - but the Apostles gave him what was <u>better</u>;
 - They gave him <u>health</u>.
 - Health without money is <u>infinitely better</u> than money without health.

- This typifies to us the Divine method of saving the world.
- The Gospel does
 <u>not aim directly at</u>
 improving men's circumstances,
 - It aims at improving men themselves.

- And so it is in the conversion of the soul.
 "If any man is in Christ, he is a new creation."
- Are you a new creature?
- Do you desire to be healed?
 - To rise up to leap with joy?
- Silver and gold won't do it.

• Acts 3:6 Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I unto you:

 In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. The doors of the church are open. The Spirit and the Bride Say "Come". Revelation 22:17



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
