# • "One thing I know; whereas I was blind, now I see." (John 9:25)

- If we have understood these things, what then?
  - Let us be thankful to God, for this understanding of Divine truth.
    - Understanding these things, ought we not seek to understand more?

 In a lecture of Sir John Lubbock's on the fertilization of flowers by the agency of insects, a striking distinction is noted in regard to this operation between beautiful and hideous plants.

 Bees delight in pleasant odors and bright colors, and invariably choose those plants which give pleasure to man.

 If we watch the course of these insects on their visit to a garden, we shall observe them settling upon the rose, the lavender, and all other flowers of brilliant hues or sweet scent.

 In marked contrast with this is the conduct of flies, which always show a preference for those which possess an unpleasant smell. • The <u>bee</u> is a creature of fine and sensitive tastes.

 The fly is "a species of insectoid vulture," naturally turning to such vegetable food as resembles carrion.

## To this love of bees for fine colors and fragrant perfumes we are indebted for our choicest flowers

 Thus, age after age, many blossoms have been growing increasingly beautiful.

• Psalms 90:17
And let the beauty
of the LORD our God
be upon us:

 On the other hand a progress in the opposite direction has taken place in those plants which are frequented by flies, and their unwholesome and repulsive qualities have become intensified.

- So is it with the two great classes into which mankind may be divided
- Men of this world,
- And those of the next.

- While the <u>purified</u> affections of the one center continually on "whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report,"
- The <u>earthward</u> and <u>vile affections</u>
   of the other
   <u>fasten on corruption.</u>

- As the laboring bee flies from one beautiful flower to another,
- So does the Christian seek all that is fairest, sweetest, and best on earth.

His prayer is that of David,
 Psalms 119:66

 "Teach me good taste"
 (which is the literal translation);

• And "

if there be any virtue,
and if there be any Praise,"
he thinks on these things.

(Philippians 4:8)

- There can be
   no shadow of doubt
   that the
   works of creation
   and
   the words of revelation
   speak with one voice.
- And that revelation
   deals principally
   <u>with the moral</u>
   <u>character of the Creator</u>
   and
   <u>the spiritual nature of man,</u>

 In the arid deserts of central South America there is a strange plant, the Selaginella convoluta, a species of club moss, endowed with very remarkable hygrometric properties.

 In the dry season, when every particle of moisture is extracted from the soil, it is detached from its growing place, rolled up into a ball, and carried away by the violent winds often to very great distances.

- It remains coiled up in this form for a considerable time; but if carried to a marsh, or the margin of a stream, or any other moist place,
- It begins slowly to unfold, and spread itself out flat on the soil, assumes its former vigor and freshness.

 When this new situation is dried up, it resumes its old habits, and, like an adventurous pilgrim, takes advantage of the wind to emigrate to a more favorable locality.

- And is not this plant
   an emblem of the man
   who is detached from Christ,
- And who therefore wanders
   <u>from one broken cistern</u>
   <u>of earthly joy</u>
   <u>to another,</u>
  - restless,
  - disappointed,
    - dissatisfied?

- He is wearied in his manifold journeys hither and thither in search of true satisfaction.
- Amid all the resources
   of modern science and art,
   there is still the same old
   vanity and vexation of spirit.
   (Ecclesiastes 1:14)

 Jesus knew well how deep and universal was the experience He was appealing to when He said, 'Come unto Me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.' (Matthew 11:28)

- We are striving to attach outward things.
  - Our <u>possessions</u>,
    - Our <u>friends</u>,
    - Our enjoyments,
      - To <u>ourselves</u>;
    - But all our efforts are to be in vain.

- Our <u>center</u> is Christ;
- And until we are in Him,
   we shall never know true peace.
  - Our root is Christ.
     (Colossians 2:7)
  - And until we are
     <u>rooted in Him,</u>
     we shall be
     <u>helpless</u> and <u>lifeless.</u>

- Attached to Him, we shall not be moved.
  - United to Him by a living faith, our hearts are fixed and at rest;

 We are intended to be united to God, to eternal life, and to all the blissful and glorious realities of the spiritual world.

•Only the heathen blinds himself to the rays of light that would penetrate his darkened mind.

• "Having eyes they see not" (Matthew 13:13)

•Psalms 119:66 Teach me good judgment and knowledge: for I have believed thy commandments.

- "Teach me good judgment"
- The word here rendered "judgment" means, properly, "taste,"
  - That power by which we determine the quality of things as sweet, bitter, sour, etc.
  - Then it is applied to the mind
     as that by which we determine the
     moral quality of things, or decide what
     is right or wrong;
     wise or foolish; good or evil.

## • Psalms 34:8 **Taste** and see that the LORD is good:

- David, who discovered
   <u>a holy taste</u>
   recommends it to others
   (Psalms 34:8),
- For the word rendered "judgment", properly signifies "taste".

 And denotes that relish for divine truth, and for the divine goodness and holiness, which is peculiar to true saints.

- Saints have a power of receiving pleasure from the beauty of holiness,
  - Which shines forth resplendently:
  - In the word of God,
  - In the divine character,
    - In the cross of Christ,
  - In the example of Christ.

- Whatever truly <u>exalts</u> God,
  - Brings the soul near to him, and influences the conduct of one who is born of God.
- "Sweeter also than honey, and the honeycomb."

- "My meditation of thee shall be sweet." (Psalms 104:34)
- "How sweet are thy words to my taste! sweeter than honey to my mouth." (Song of Solomon 2:3)
  - "O taste and see that the Lord is good." (Psalms 34:8)

- It is only the spiritual man that discerns the things of God.
- Hebrews 5:14 But strong meat belongeth to them that are of full age, even those who by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil.

# Proverbs 8:10 Receive my instruction, and not silver; and knowledge rather than choice gold.

- What does <u>wisdom</u> offer?
  - She offers to surpass in value everything that men have yet honored.
- She will put aside rubies, and things that are to be desired, and all gold,
- She will stand alone,
   <u>absolutely unique in worth.</u>
  - Gold may be lost;
     rubies maybe stolen;

He who is without wisdom is without riches. He who has wisdom has all wealth.

- Wisdom is an absolute necessity
   to man's well-being, which gold is not.
- Wisdom is to be preferred to wealth,
   because the latter
   may be destructive to character,
  - Many men have been <u>morally destroyed</u>
     <u>by their riches.</u>

- One has well said,
   "God has made
   the world double."
- The kingdom of heaven is like so much in the natural world, that our blessed Lord hardly ever spoke of sacred truths without illustrating them by the more familiar things of earth.

- <u>His illustrations</u> were drawn from the simplest subjects.
- His <u>divine</u> wisdom <u>was to be understood</u> <u>by all in every age.</u>
- The common people heard Him gladly.

  (Mark 12:37)

 Colossians 2:3 In whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge.

 How is it possible to estimate the value of the soul without a knowledge of Him whose death was the price of its redemption?

 Where is the wisdom that can secure the harmony between what man is and what he ought to be?

- Where is the knowledge that can bring beauty out of the chaos which religion discovers?
  - It is in Christ alone:
    - In Him are hid all the treasures.

- We see <u>virtue</u> oppressed and <u>vice</u> triumphant,
- We see might over right,
  - •Where is the solution?
    - The solution is in Christ.
- In the knowledge of Christ we see the rule of a "righteous Father" (John 17:25)

- Knowledge is enlightenment, acquaintance with truth;
  - Wisdom is the application of the truth.
- Knowledge is the study, wisdom its fruit.

- Treasures suggest great value and excellence.
  (Parable of Lost Treasure)
- All the treasures are in Christ; not select truths, <u>but all truth</u>. (John14:6)
- So all knowledge for the human soul find their truest meaning in Him.

- He emancipates

   the mind

   from the bondage
   of corruption and fear,
- The wisdom of God sanctifies all earthly wisdom.

- Who does not see
   that the light
   which Christ brings
   enhances and elevates
   every branch of knowledge?
  - The word "hid"
     implies that
     wisdom and knowledge
     are stored up in Him
     in a hidden manner,
     suggesting —

- (1) Concealment.
- All these treasures
   are not seen at once

   by the bodily or spiritual eye.
  - They <u>are hid</u> from the thoughtless and unbelieving world, from the vain and unassisted intellect (<u>1 Corinthians 2:8</u>).

- God has hid these things from the wise and prudent, and revealed them unto babes.
   (Matthew 11:25)
  - Just as many with
     an untrained eye
     traverse a country
     rich in mineral wealth,
     <u>and have no idea</u>
     <u>of what lies under the surface,</u>

 So the treasures that are hid in Christ are only seen by the eye of faith, and found by the devout and contrite soul taught by the Spirit of God.

- (2) But these treasures are intended for discovery and application.
  - They are gradually unfolded.
- Yet the riches
   are still inexhaustible,
   and the oldest disciples
   are ever discovering
   some new vein of preciousness
   in their Lord.
  - So it will ever be.

- Jesus intends that
  we should use old knowledge
  in a new light
  and use it in His service.
- When one does that, what he knew before
   becomes a greater treasure than ever it was.

The word
 "knowledge"
 occurs 172 times
 in 169 verses in KJV.

 2 Peter 3:18 But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour **Jesus Christ.** To him be glory both now and for ever. Amen.

#### Matthew 13:53

And it came to pass, that when Jesus had finished these parables, he departed thence.

 13:54 And when he was come into his own country, he taught them in their synagogue, insomuch that they were astonished, and said, Whence hath this man this wisdom, and these mighty works? Matthew 13:55

Is not this the carpenter's son? is not his mother called Mary? and his brethren, James, and Joses, and Simon, and Judas?

• 13:56 And his sisters, are they not all with us?

Whence then hath this man all these things?

#### Matthew 13:57

And they were offended in him.

But Jesus said unto them, A prophet is not without honour, save in his own country, and in his own house.

• 13:58 And he did not many mighty works there because of their unbelief.

- There is a great lesson here.
- In any church service

  the congregation preaches

  more than
  half the sermon.
  - The congregation brings with it an atmosphere of <u>belief</u> or <u>unbelief</u>.

### Many a message has been killed stone dead,

- Not because there was anything wrong with it;
- But because the minds of the hearers
   were so closed
  that it never had a chance.

When we meet together to listen to the word of God, we must come with eager expectation.

 An empty vessel capable of holding water, if tightly corked, and thrown into the sea, still remains empty.

- So it is with our hearts;
   unbelief closes them,
  - So that the "water of life" cannot fill them, however abundantly it may be poured upon and around us.
