

## Thus saith the Lord...

- As we begin <u>Ch. 26</u> we find some interesting contrasts.
  - 1st While the "religious" Jewish leaders were plotting to kill Christ, the believers at Bethany were honoring Him!
    - 2nd Mary's act of love was accepted by Christ
- And <u>criticized by the disciples</u>,
   <u>Judas</u> being the chief accuser.

- John explains why <u>Judas</u> criticized her:
- He was <u>a thief</u> and wanted the money for himself!
   <u>John 12:6</u>.
  - It is sad to see <u>Peter</u> agreeing with <u>Judas</u> and
    - walking "in the counsel of the ungodly" (Psa\_1:1).
    - Soon to be "<u>standing in the way of sinners"</u> (John18:18)
  - And then "sitting in the seat of the scornful" (Luk 22:55),
    - Finally, <u>denying his Lord</u> three times.

- It is <u>a dangerous thing</u>
   for Christians
   to judge one another.
  - Matthew 7:1-5
- Why do you see the speck in your brother's eye but fail to notice the beam in your own eye?

- Judas called
   Mary's worship "waste,"
   but Jesus said it was
   a lasting memorial!
- To this day, wherever the Gospel is preached,
   Mary and her loving deed are mentioned.

- Did this <u>stinging rebuke</u> from Christ made Judas all the more anxious to betray Him.
  - Leaving Bethany Judas
     <u>now plots with</u>
     the Jewish leaders
     to arrest Christ.
  - They agreed for thirty pieces of silver, as the Scriptures promised (Zechariah 11:12).

- Peter, on the other hand, went with John to prepare the
   Passover feast for Christ (Luke 22:8).
  - With all of his failings,
     Peter <u>loved</u> Christ and <u>trusted</u> Him,
- While <u>Judas</u> went out from them, <u>because he was not of them</u>
   (1John 2:18-19).

- Matthew 26:14
   Then one of the twelve, called <u>Judas Iscariot</u>, went unto the chief priests,
- 26:15 And said unto them, What will ye give me, and I will deliver him unto you? And they covenanted with him for thirty pieces of silver.
  - 26:16 And from that time he sought opportunity to betray him.

- We find Judas both fascinating and frightening.
  - Fascinating because we don't understand him
    - And <u>frightening</u>
       because
       we have a tendency
       to be like him.

## • Three people stand out in the account of the last hours of the Lord before Calvary:

- Christ,
  - Peter,
- Judas Iscariot.

- It is interesting to see how Peter and Judas are contrasted in this chapter,
- Each one teaching us spiritual lessons by his failures.

## Judas is a warning against:

- Resisting the Word of God
  - And <u>rejecting</u> Christ;
  - Peter is an illustration of how a believer may backslide.

- We're <u>not so sure</u> we want to crack that book open.
- Nevertheless, here we are ---
  - Ready to take

     a closer look

     at the disciple named

     Judas.

- Here's <u>what we know</u> based on our text from Matthew:
  - We know Judas
     sought out the chief priests,
  - And asked them <u>how much</u> he could get to betray Jesus.
    - We know they agreed on thirty pieces of silver to do the deed.

- We know that at the Last Supper
   Jesus knew Judas
   was to betray him
- But <u>still included him</u> in the supper
  - In the breaking of bread
  - And the cup of the covenant
  - "poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins."

- May I suggest <u>four reasons</u> why Judas betrayed Jesus.
  - # 1 It may have been because of greed.
- John tells us that <u>Judas was a thief</u>.
   (John 12:6).
  - Being a "<u>lover of money</u>"
     he struck one of the most dreadful bargains in history.

- 2nd It may have been because of bitter hatred, based on complete disillusionment.
- It may be that Judas looked on Jesus as the divinely sent leader, who, with his miraculous powers, could lead the great rebellion against Rome.
- Judas may have hated Jesus because <u>he was not the Christ</u>
   <u>he wished him to be.</u>

- # 3 It may be that Judas never intended Jesus to die.
- He may have betrayed Jesus with the intention of compelling him to act.
  - To become the great leader that <u>Judas</u> and <u>all the apostles</u> <u>expected Him to be</u>.

- The tragedy of Judas is that he <u>refused</u> to accept Jesus as he was.
- He tried to make Jesus what he wanted him to be.
- It is <u>not Jesus</u> who can be changed by us,
  - But <u>it is us</u> who must be changed by Jesus.

- # 4 Another theory holds that it was Satan working through Judas, that Judas didn't really have any say in the act.
  - This theory has an interesting counterpart that suggests what Judas did, although wrong, was actually the will of God,
    - And therefore Judas didn't have a choice.

- Why might people like the theory that "the devil made Judas do it"?
  - People like to shoulder the responsibility to someone else.
    - Adam did it and it continues till this day.
  - Have you ever done it?
  - If we accept that theory then we destroy "free-will".

- I think it is safe to say that the <u>most likely reason</u>
   Judas did what he did was either:
  - (a) He was a simple thief who saw a chance to make some money;
    - (b) Or he thought he knew better than God.

• The sin of thinking one knows better than God, has been with us from the beginning.

It's what got
 Adam and Eve
 in trouble.

- Many <u>preachers</u>

   and church leaders

   are doing that even today.
- Perverting the word of God.
  - Organizing the church their way.
    - Etc.

- Many today have <u>like Judas</u>
   misunderstood the Messiah.
- Building their work on their ideas and not the word of God.

- Judas may have wanted
   <u>a military Messiah</u>,
   which was the common view.
  - By having Jesus arrested, Judas may have thought he could jump start the revolution.
    - Sounded great to Judas.

- Jeremiah 10:23
   O LORD, I know that the way of man is not in himself:
   it is not in man that walks to direct his steps.
- How <u>often</u> have we seen that in the Bible.
- How often have we seen that in our own lives?

- The irony is that through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God's kingdom and rule on earth is established.
- But the enemy defeated is not the Roman Empire but sin and death.

## • 1Cor 15:56 The sting of death is sin;

• 1Cor 15:55
O death, where is thy sting?
O grave, where is thy victory?

• <u>1Cor 15:57</u>

But thanks be to God, which gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

- What led Judas to betray his Lord and Savior?
- How could one who had been with Jesus...
  - Seen His miracles
- Heard His <u>teachings</u>.

- What about <u>us</u>?
- Could we be guilty
   of betraying Jesus
   in some way?
- Are there things
   that misled Judas
   that could have
   a similar effect on us?

- Judas was no stranger to Jesus.
  - He was one of the <u>apostles</u> (Matthew 10:2-4)
    - He was among those whom Jesus loved (John 13:1)
      - Yet as prophesied,
         Jesus was betrayed by "a familiar friend" (Psalms 41:9)

Just being His disciples
 <u>is no assurance</u>
 we will not betray Him

•Like several of the churches in Asia Minor, we could...

- Leave our <u>first love</u>
   (Rev 2:4-5)
- Begin to tolerate <u>false doctrine</u> (Rev 2:14-16)
  - Permit <u>false teachers</u>
     to spread their doctrines (Rev 2:20)
    - Become <u>lukewarm</u> (Rev 3:15-16)

Therefore we need to heed Jesus' admonition to be
 "faithful unto death" (Rev 2:10),

- The deceitfulness of riches can render us unfruitful. (Matthew 13:22)
  - Thus leading us to stray from the faith and drown in destruction and perdition. (1Timothy 6:9-10)

- Why did Judas betrayed Jesus with a kiss...
  - Luke 22:48
     Jesus said to him,
     "Judas, do you intend to betray the Son of Man with a kiss?"
    - The sign of friendship and affection employed in a base and wicked purpose.

## Displays of affection don't ensure faithfulness.

- Many people are very emotional in their worship.
- Believing it to be evidence of being "Spirit-filled"
  - Yet emotions alone are not a reliable guide

- Jeremiah 17:9
   The heart is deceitful
   above all things,
   and desperately wicked:
   who can know it?
- Proverbs 16:25
   There is a way
   that seems right unto a man,
   but the end thereof are
   the ways of death.
- Jeremiah 10:23
   O LORD, I know that the way of man is not in himself:
   it is not in man to direct his steps.

- The Spirit does produce fruit in our lives that affects our emotions.
  - Galatians 5:22
    But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith,
- <u>5:23</u> Meekness, temperance: against such there is no law.
  - But we must keep them in the proper order:

- Our emotions must come from faith, not faith coming from emotions
  - Otherwise we are led by <u>emotionalism</u>,
     not faith.
  - And true faith comes from the Word of God.
- Romans 10:17
  So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.

- We can be guilty of thinking our service is acceptable, when it is not.
  - Matthew 7:21
  - Not every one
- that says unto me, <u>Lord</u>, <u>Lord</u>, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven;
- but he that does the will of my Father which is in heaven.

- We can't know God's directions unless He reveals them.
  - <u>Isaiah 55:8</u>

For my thoughts <u>are not</u> your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways," declares the LORD.

- Ecclesiastes 5:1
  Watch your step whenever you visit
  God's house,
  - and come more <u>ready to listen</u> than to offer a fool's sacrifice,
- since fools never think they're doing evil.


- While Jesus was betrayed by Judas, <u>let's not forget</u>
   <u>the influence of Satan...</u>
- Satan <u>used Judas</u> to betray Jesus.
  - Luke 22:3
     Then Satan entered the heart of Judas Iscariot, who was one of the twelve apostles.
- John 6:70
  Jesus replied, "I chose all twelve of you.
  Yet, one of you is a devil."

- How did Satan influence Judas?
  - By some of the very things we may be influenced by.
- Through his love of money
- Through his <u>emotionalism</u>
- Through his <u>mistaken ideas</u>

- Even <u>Peter</u> was influenced by Satan through some of these very things (<u>Matthew 16:23</u>)
  - And while we may <u>despise</u> the treachery of Judas,
  - We can **learn** from his mistakes.
    - We can also learn from <a href="Peter">Peter</a> who chose a different route.
