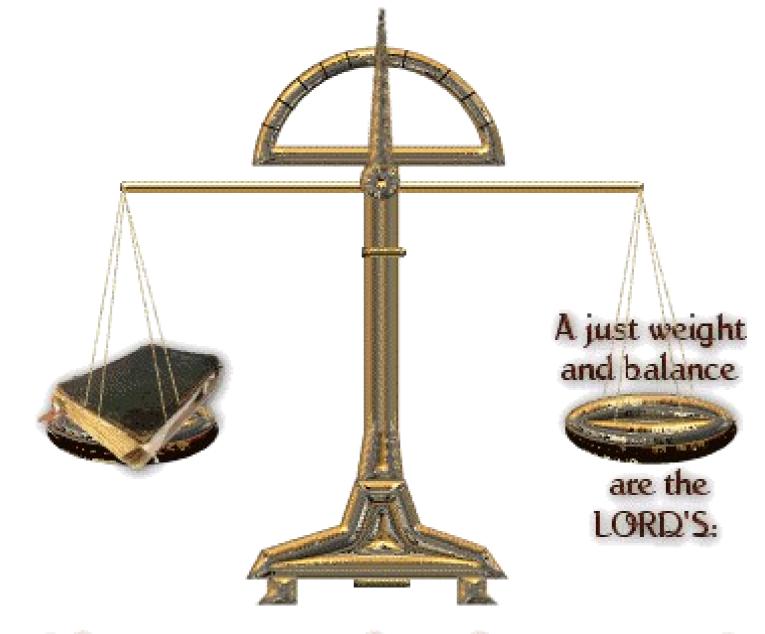

### Thus saith the Lord...

"We have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus has gone as our forerunner." (Hebrews 6:19-20)

# •Then the apostle compares Jesus to Melchizedek

Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedek. (Hebrews 7:17)

- Again and again in this letter he has used this phrase,
- "a high priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek."
  - The sheer repetition of it indicates there is something very vital hidden here.
    - Now we shall see what that is.

The incident upon which it is based comes again from
 Abraham's life,

• Recorded in

Genesis 14,

the story of

Abraham & Melchizedek.

- As Abraham was returning from battle with the <u>five kings</u>,
  - A stranger met him and <u>blessed</u> him,
  - And Abraham gave tithes to this man.
- Melchizedek steps suddenly
   out of the shadows of history,
   to appear on the stage of Scripture,

- For this Melchizedek, <u>king of Salem,</u> <u>priest of the Most High God,</u>
  - He is first, by translation, king of righteousness,
    - and king of Salem,
       that is,

king of peace.
(Hebrews 7:1-3)

- He is without:
- father or mother
  - or genealogy,
- and has <u>neither</u> beginning of days
  - nor end of life,
- but resembling the Son of God he continues a priest forever. (Hebrews 7:1-3 RSV)

### Here is an ordinary man named Melchizedek,

- a <u>priest</u> of the true God,
- who lived in the village of Salem
- (later known as <u>Jerusalem</u>)
  - who met <u>Abraham</u> returning from battle.

 He is fulfilling a role which beautifully mirrors the ministry of Jesus Christ to us today.

- We must bear in mind that Melchisedek was a man like any other.
  - There, is no ground, in my judgment, for the thought of anything mysterious in the facts as to his person.

The manner in which scripture introduces him is such as to furnish a very striking type of Christ.

- The Spirit of God was pleased to conceal the line of Melchisedec's parentage, or descendants if any, of their birth or death.
- •He is <u>suddenly</u> ushered upon the scene.

- As mysteriously as he came...
  - He disappeared.
  - There is no record of Abraham having ever met him before or again.
    - In fact nothing else is said of Melchizedek in Scripture until David mentions him in Psalm 110.

## There is a word of authority here:

- "He is first, by translation of his name, king of righteousness,
  - and then he is also king of Salem,
     that is,
     king of peace."

- What is it that Jesus Christ can give you today?
  - He can give you only <u>what he is</u>, that is all.
    - It takesChristto be aChristian!

- We need

   what he is

   in order to be

   what he was,
- And what

   he is

   is revealed
   in his names.

- He is first of all,
   "king of righteousness,"
  - He is the one who has the secret of right conduct which results in proper behavior.

- He is also the king of peace.
- •May I use the
  equivalent
  modern term for that
  phrase?
  - •Mental health!

- He holds in his hand the secret of rest. of inner calm, which gives purpose to human life.
- This is so desperately needed today.

# Melchizedek King of Righteousness and King of Peace. (Hebrews 7:2)

• The order is at once significant and unavoidable.

- Righteousness must always come before peace.
- Without righteousness there can be no peace.
  - How do we know?

- "Therefore since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God." (Romans 5:1)
- "The kingdom of God is...
  righteousness, peace and joy."
  (Romans 14:17)
  - The order is always the same.
  - First <u>righteousness</u> and then <u>peace</u>.

- It may well be said that all <u>life</u> is a <u>search for peace</u>,
- And also that men persist in looking for it in the wrong place.

- Men look for peace in escape
  - But the trouble about escape is that it is always necessary to return to reality.

 It is always possible to find some kind of peace by the route of escape, but it is never a lasting peace.

Escape is not wrong; sometimes it is necessary if health and sanity are to be preserved; but it is

never a cure.

- •There is the peace of evasion.
  - Many a man seeks peace by refusing to face his problems.

- No one ever solved a problem by refusing to look at it.
- However much
   we evade it,
   it is still there.

- And problems are like diseases.
- •The longer we refuse to face them the worse they get.

- There is the way of compromise.
  - •But compromise leads to tension.
- Therefore compromise is the enemy of peace.

- There is no real peace for any man until he has said:
   "Thy will be done."
  - But once that is said, peace floods his soul.
    - It happened even to <u>Jesus</u>.
    - It is the way to lasting peace.

 Jesus entered the Garden under such tension that he sweated blood.

•In the Garden

he accepted God's will

and came out

at peace.

- To take the way of righteousness,
  - To accept God's will
- Is to find the way to lasting peace.

- Now, back to Melchizedek.
  - "He is without father or mother or genealogy,
    - and has neither beginning of days or end of life,
  - But resembling
     the Son of God
     he continues a priest forever."

# • This verse means is that there is no mention made of Melchizedek's ancestry,

- Or any record of his birth or death.
  - He was a perfectly normal man,
- All these things were true of him.

 The silence of the record is taken as an illustration of the eternal, changeless. unending priesthood of Jesus Christ.

This means he is available twenty-four hours a day. seven days a week, fifty-two weeks a year, throughout every year of a whole lifetime.

- We are never out of His reach.
- Never separated from his <u>wisdom</u>,
  - Never separated from His <u>peace</u>,
    - Never separated from his <u>truth</u>.
      - That is what the Melchizedek priesthood means,
        - And what
           the world
           is hungering after today.

## • The apostle does not dwell on

the detailed application of His Melchisedec priesthood,

- There was no incense,
  - No sacrifice.
- He alludes to several facts,
   but leaves them.


 The battle which Abraham fought, the first recorded one in scripture, is the type of the battle of the ages.
